



### History of Lowerhouse Cricket Club.

DREVIOUS to starting on their present ground, there were two clubs in Lowerhouse playing under the names of "Garibaldians " and " Britannia," the first one playing on a ground near the Griffin Hotel and the latter one on a ground called the "Holme." In August, 1862, these two clubs met together and after their meeting approached the late Mr. James Dugdale, who let them have the field they now occupy and which has since been loaned to them by Messrs. Dugdale. The members in their spare time did the draining and relaying of the ground and eventually made a good playing pitch. Of the founders of the club, mention must be made of the father of the famous three brothers, Branch, who played such a prominent part in Burnley cricket, the father at this time working as a book-keeper in the mill at Lowerhouse. Mention must also be made of the late T. Holland, A. Wolstenholme, W. Whittaker, and T. Lavcock, who took such a prominent part in playing, and also J. Varley, who was the first president of the club, and W. Smith, the treasurer, while of those who are still members of the club, and who also helped the club materially we have W. Wilkinson, J. Elliott, J. Clapham, and R. Grimshaw. We must also mention D. Haworth, who at that time was considered to be one of the finest left-hand bowlers in the district. On one occasion he was playing against Harwood, a noted club at this time, Charley Ullathorne being Harwood's pro. Haworth obtained four wickets in good time, but owing to a dispute arising about a batsman being given out l.b.w., the match was abandoned. It was contended that a batsman could not be given out l.b.w. to a left-hand bowler. Haworth subsequently went to Rochdale to join his brother in the business of a printer, and a few years ago he came over to Lowerhouse to be present at one of their matches. At this time Lowerhouse was a good local village team, and amongst its players was I. Walton, who was nick-named "Bray," after catching Bray out, who was then pro. at Turf Moor. C. Ingham was the wicketkeeper about this time, and it was quite an honour to him when he went to Old Trafford to assist Lancashire against Kent. James Wilkinson was also a good all round cricketer. After leaving Lowerhouse, he assisted Burnley in 1878, and rendered good service whilst playing at Turf Moor. James Hartley was also a player about this time, and ever since he has taken a great interest

in the doings of both players and club up to the time of his death, H. Whittaker, P. Whittaker, W. Crabtree and T. Sagar must also be included in the list of players previous to the days of professionals. It was not until the year 1874 that Lowerhouse claimed a professional of their own, he being called Gibson Price, of Birkenhead, his salary being very small in comparison to present day professionals' salaries. On the whole, he did very well for the club, his average at the finish of the season being: batting, 9 innings, 1 not out, highest score 54, total runs 246, average 30.75; bowling, 25 wickets, average 17.2. Coming to more recent years, we have had some very good players, amongst whom might be mentioned the late Sam Barnes, Richard Holden, and J. H. Sherman, also W. Bowling, who is still a member and supporter of the club. In 1890, a most remarkable occurrence took place with regard to the club's prize for the best aggregate, S. Barnes and W. Bowling tieing with 209 each.

One of the outstanding figures in connection with Lowerhouse is T. Shutt, who has filled professional engagements with Stalybridge, Perth, Howick, Liverpool Northern, Lowerhouse, Rishton, and Read, his performances with Lowerhouse with both bat and ball has been good, and as an amateur member of the team he knocked up three centuries, whilst he has hit up two centuries as an amateur for Burnley. His feats include in 1895, \*173, which for a time stood as a Lancashire League record, his centuries in addition for Lowerhouse, \*102 in 1909 and \*113 in 1910. T. Shutt has also rendered splendid service with the ball, having the best average on record as an amateur, 76 wickets in 1910. Other centurions for the club are: Vost, pro., 112 and \*110 in 1903; and \*100 in 1905; R. Holden, \*110 in 1896; J. Cook. 118 in 1901; W. Whittaker, 100 in 1906 and 122 in 1911. Lowerhouse have also produced a county player in J. S. Heap, who ioined the staff in 1903. This does not in any wav exhaust the list of excellent batsmen and bowlers who have done excellent work for the club, amongst whom must be mentioned M. J. Walker, W. Whittaker, J. J. Elliott, &c. To W. Cook (pro.) belongs the honour of having taken the most wickets in one season, 130 in 1920, while the highest aggregates for the club have been made by Harrison (pro.) 692 in 1913, and J. Cook (amateur), 555 in 1900.

In 1873, the first Amateur Athletic Sports was held at Lowerhouse on August 23rd, and these resulted in a profit of £11 16s. 9½d., the receipts being £30 5s. 3½d., expenses £18 8s. 6d. These

sports were held annually for a period of 32 years, the last being on June 24th, 1905.

Mr. Wilkinson the late secretary, was appointed in 1882, and with the exception of two years during which Mr. J. H. Sherman acted as secretary, he fulfilled this position until 1915. During his office as secretary, a few figures are given from the balance sheet which will no doubt be interesting. In 1882 the gate receipts were £19, members' subscriptions £34, number of members 93, total receipts £218, expenses £197, professional's wages £37. In 1892 the gate receipts were £49, members' subscriptions £61, professional's wages £110, total receipts £562 (including £300 from sports), and expenses £535. In 1902 the gate receipts, with the addition of refreshments, were £180, members' subscriptions £175, total receipts £648, expenses £591. In 1913 the gate receipts, with refreshments, were £169, members' subscriptions £172, total receipts £446. On the season's working, it showed a loss of £68; total members 570. In 1900 the committee had to make preparation for alterations to the ground owing to a new road being made to Rosegrove. This necessitated the building of a new pavilion and putting up good hoarding on one side of the field. The pavilion was built during the winter and was formally opened in May, 1901, by Mr. G. T. Gill, president of the Lancashire Cricket League, the total cost of alterations being about £400. Towards this, the committee had to get a loan of £250 from J. T. Dugdale, Esq., and it was for the purpose of clearing off this and also the overdraft at the bank that a bazaar was held in 1914.

League cricket was suspended for three seasons during the Great War, and when we came to start again in 1919 we were faced with a big cost of having all our fencing repaired and having to buy new seating for all round the field. To accomplish this we approached our president, Col. A. Dugdale, for the loan of £500, which he willingly loaned the club. He also lent us the money to buy and erect an Army Hut in 1921; this is used as a public tea room and one portion is used as a members' social and recreation club. We are still owing Col. Dugdale the loan and part of the cost of the Army Hut. The effort we are now making is to reduce or clear off these debts and other creditors.

We take this opportunity of thanking all members and supporters for their kind support, and hope that they will still rally around the old club and help to put it on a good sound financial basis. We, the Committee, are sure that all members and supporters will agree with us in tendering to Col. Dugdale our most sincere thanks for his kindness to the club.
